COVID-19 Precautions

One wonders how many more Newsletters will start off with these words of warning. The virus is still very much with us and so please keep 2 metres away from other people when walking on Avon Meadows. Many of the paths are not wide enough for people to pass and keep a 2 metre distance, do show courtesy and step off the path to let others pass.

Progress on the Wetland

It has been very much stop-go-stop with work parties as the infection rate waxes and wanes. In the event we only had time to clear one area of reeds this winter and have decided not to attempt another as the bird breeding season will be in full swing (over?) by the time the COVID-19 restrictions are relaxed.

We will continue to keep the safe passing places beside the main paths clear. This work will be managed carefully to avoid social distancing issues.

The new dipping platform is not operational yet. Plans are in hand to put gravel down to get to the platform and also on the very muddy section of path from the boardwalk past the dipping platform.

It was mentioned in the last Newsletter that the two footbridges in the North Meadow have been removed. They are to be replaced with culverts which will allow water to flow but present a fairly flat surface to walk over.

Clearly conditions underfoot need to improve before contractor's heavy machinery can be moved onto the site.

Bird 'Flu

A few weeks ago there were reports of swans dying from bird 'flu. This was noticed in places where a great many swans gathered together (e.g. Worcester). As you know, we do not have that density of Mute Swans on Avon Meadows and no illness has been noticed so far.

'Our' adult Mute Swans have chased off their cygnets in preparation for their next breeding season. This is quite normal behaviour. At the moment there is no sign of nest building but it is something to look out for.





NEW! ARTS PROJECT FOR ALL

Beauty and Utility - Avon Meadows Art Projects

The contemporary art charity, Meadow Arts, has commissioned three artists to create projects and artworks at Avon Meadows during 2020/21.

The theme 'beauty and utility' will explore the practical and aesthetic value of the floodplain meadows and wetlands through the changing seasons. The projects will also reflect on the past and present uses of floodplain meadows such as floodwater management, community benefits, wildlife habitats and animal grazing over winter.

The first artist is Andrew Howe. Since December, Andrew has been collecting reeds, plants, berries, soil, and other materials from Avon Meadows. The sourced materials will be used to make paper, natural dyes, and pigments for his artwork.

<u>Andrew is very keen to engage with Friends of Avon</u> <u>Meadows and the wider community via some upcoming online</u> <u>workshops</u>. These events will provide an insight into the artistic process and give the chance for participants to be creative at home (perhaps some light-hearted fun in these challenging times).

BIRDS

2020

For humans COVID-19 was and is the overriding problem. For birds the variations in the weather had to be coped with. The total species count for the year was **104** species, which makes 2020 our third best year. There is a dedicated group of expert bird watchers checking the meadows now which results in nothing much getting missed!

As reported in the last Newsletter, our one new species for Avon Meadows in 2020 was a <u>Tree Pipit</u> bringing the total count since we started recording to **131** species.

The overall total number of species of all sorts of living things is found so far on Avon Meadows is **1,133**! If you are interested in insects or spiders there is plenty of opportunity to increase this number!

Generally it was a good breeding season and we know that our <u>Cetti's Warblers</u> and <u>Water Rails</u> all produced young. The most exciting breeding record was of a <u>Common Grasshopper</u> <u>Warbler</u>, a bird that had only been recorded a couple of times before on Avon Meadows.

Weekly Bird Count

The average count over the last twelve weeks has been 44 species per week, one better than the previous quarter!

We have recorded 63 species so far this year which at this very early stage makes it the third best year so far.

Recent flooding has had the effect of reducing the variety of species recorded in part because of the change in available habitat and in part because recorders cannot get to where the birds may be!

Interesting or Unusual Species

Looking back at the last quarter of 2020, a <u>Green Sandpiper</u> was seen on 5 Nov, <u>Wigeon on 8 & 15 Nov</u>, a flock of <u>Lesser</u> <u>Redpolls</u> on 12 Nov, a <u>Yellowhammer</u> on 22 Nov and a <u>Common</u> <u>Gull</u> on 28 Dec.

Still early days for 2021 but a flock of 70 <u>Lapwing</u> was recorded on New Year's day. Several <u>Blackcaps</u> are overwintering with us, a country-wide phenomenon due to recent milder winters. There have been up to 5 <u>Common</u> <u>Stonechats</u> in and around Avon Meadows. Oddly, there have been very few <u>Coot</u> around, one seen on 21 Jan 21 was the first (and so far only) one recorded since 4 June 2020!

In late December there were <u>Starling</u> murmurations with up to an estimated 10,000 birds over the meadows! Most of the murmurations were less than half that number. It seems that Starlings begin to gather in big numbers over Avon Meadows and are then tempted to go off to the Gwen Finch Reserve near Birlingham! The numbers on successive nights were very variable so persistence was necessary to see a good display!


